New Stock.

We have also seen a lot of new stock arrive lately including some 38mm NG Rosewood, 200 x 25 Jarrah, mixed width 25mm Blackwood, 200 x 25 Spotted Gum, 38mm Brush Box and various sizes of Tas Oak. Have you looked at our slabs lately? We had some unidentified slabs which we now believe are Incense Cedar. They are a warm yellow colour with good tight knots. This timber is quite stable and easy to work. There are several 50mm slabs around 450mm wide available.

Acclimatising timber.

A number of times recently we have been asked for advice about acclimatising timber, especially considering the current weather patterns. I'm talking mainly about solid flooring. When a new floor arrives at site it should be checked by the layer to establish its moisture content. Then the decision to acclimatise or not can be made. Secondly, it's no use acclimatising timber in the garage or house where the conditions are vastly different to those expected in service. With all the rain we are getting it is possible to see a dramatic increase in moisture content of your flooring. Of course, when the house is finished and heaters turned on the flooring then dries and shrinks. Some movement is always going to happen with timber flooring but the idea is to minimise it as much as possible. Acclimatising under the wrong conditions can create a problem instead of avoiding one. A good floor layer will assess all of the factors and then decide a suitable approach. For our part, we guarantee all flooring to be less than 14% MC which then gives the layer good place to start.
